PARK & FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS



CENTURY EAST PARK

The new Century East playground was installed in 2020 through a community build. Park updates were completed this year with the additions of a new park sign and landscaping around the playground.

HANOVER ESTATES PARK

Hanover Estates Park was developed with a new playground, walking path, shelter, trees, and landscaping. The Park Dedication took place on September 8.

ROUND BARN FARM

The Round Barn Farm tennis court was resurfaced to allow for two pickleball courts. Staff completed electrical improvements in the park and planted 40 trees. The clean up of the old farm structures, storage areas, and grounds continued.

HANSEN COMMUNITY CENTER

The exterior renovation of the HCC was completed including a new roof, paved and striped parking lot with a new traffic pattern, renovated market entrance, native plant landscaping, enhanced security with entry control, and LED parking lights.



CENTRAL PARK

Recent park improvements include a new paved and striped parking lot, the conversion of the sand volleyball court into a skating/ice rink, LED lighting upgrades on pavilions and park lighting, and enhanced security with cameras. The Central Park Fishing Pier was officially dedicated to Bill Delaney on July 20.

RECREATION







THE DEN

The Den Before and After Care Program saw many improvements, such increased site security with new key fobs for parents, better communication with the new Procare app, improved staffing stability and retention. The program received the IAPD Power Play grant for the 2023-24 school year.

CAMPS

The Procare app was piloted in summer camps for staff time and attendance. Staff focused in staff engagement and stability, improving daily programming, and better parent communication.

ATHLETICS

Youth athletics saw growth in participation all around from youth leagues to new instructional programs, like tumbling and new fitness programs. MPD received a generous gift from MYAA to use towards youth athletics.



Foundation granted over \$2100 to families to attend MPD programs at a reduced rate or free of charge.















GENERAL

Early Childhood, Youth General, and Adult & Teen programs all saw growth with new preschool music programs, professionally planned and led adult trips, and additional sections of favorite programs, like Pollywogs Playgroup.

DANCE

2022-23 saw the first Spring Dance Recital and the steady re-growth of the dance program after the pandemic. A new parent-tot dance class was created to attract our youngest dancers to the MPD Dance Academy.

EVENTS

FY 2022-23 brought record numbers to events like the Trick or Treat Trail, Round Barn Winter Fest, and Sip of Summer. Round Barn Heritage Fest, and Parties in the Park were added to the annual event schedule.




ANNUAL PARTICIPATION

ATHLETICS PARTICIPATION




THE DEN & CAMP PARTICIPATION

GENERAL PROGRAM PARTICIPATION




FISCAL INTEGRITY

With approximately 300 acres of open space, including 10 developed parks, athletic facilities, and natural areas, the Manhattan Park District serves a region of nearly 36 square miles encompassing all of Manhattan Township, and provides value to a population of approximately 13,000 people while sustaining fiscal integrity.



FUTURE PLANNING



ROUND BARN FARM

With the completion of the master site plan, future work includes the restoration of the 100-ft Round Barn and future event venue, pavilion improvements, and cleanup of outdoor storage areas. A Federal Recreational Trails Program grant application was submitted to fund trail expansion and development.



FIREHOUSE AQUISITION

The acquisition of Station 81 is a critical step towards meeting the space needs of a growing district and completing the Central Park Campus. This sale highlights the positive outcomes of intergovernmental partnerships that benefit the entire community.



IVANHOE PARK

Ivanhoe Park is on track for development within two years. An OSALD grant application was submitted for this park development.



PRAIRIE TRAILS PARK

Piloting a new model in park development, MPD partnered with the Village and developer to complete the park development early in the neighborhood buildout rather than upon completion.



CONSERVATION

A focus on future conservation efforts includes pond bank stabilization, storm water management, the establishment of no mow zones including in the Grove, Round Oak Barn diversification of the tree planting program, and native plantings when possible.
